

Translational Hearing Center Given Five-Year Grant

Creighton's Translational Hearing Center has been awarded a <u>\$10.8 million grant</u>, payable over five years and competitively renewable up to 15 years, by the NIH-affiliated Centers of Biomedical Research Excellence (COBRE). The award will fund a working partnership between the Translational Hearing Center, Boys Town National Research Center and the University of Nebraska Medical Center as the three institutions seek to translate basic hearing loss research into practical therapies. Led by **Jian Zuo**, PhD, chair of the Department of Biomedical Sciences, and **Peter Steyger**, PhD, professor of biomedical sciences and director of the Translational Hearing Center, the partnership will build a corps of academic researchers dedicated to battling hearing loss resulting from numerous causes.
