Nursing Receives Loan Program Award

The College of Nursing has been awarded \$43,313 for the Nurse Faculty Loan Program (NFLP) from the U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA). The NFLP's goal is to increase qualified nursing faculty in the U.S. by providing partial loan forgiveness to those who secure full-time employment in a nursing faculty role. Combined with last year's award of \$169,969 and additional contributions from the College of Nursing, Creighton can provide financial assistance to students in the Master of Science in Nursing Education program or the Post Graduate Certificate in Nursing Education. **Anne Schoening**, PhD, RN, CNE, is project director for the NFLP and author of the grant submissions. **Linda Bendorf**, manager of financial services, and **Janet Solberg**, director of financial aid, also serve on the NFLP Project Team.

A team from Creighton received the "Spirit of Advocacy Award" from the Metro Immunization Task Force for work with the COVID-19 community vaccine clinics held in the Rasmussen Center. **Julie Manz**, PhD, assistant dean in the College of Nursing; **Tricia Sharrar**, JD, vice president of compliance; **Mike Miller**, EdD, director and assistant professor of emergency medical services (EMS) education; and **Jenny Tilleman**, PharmD, associate professor of pharmacy, made up a core group that organized the clinics and reached out to students and colleagues across the University for support. The four were at every Saturday clinic for three and a half months and oversaw the administration of more than 42,000 doses of vaccine.
