Kirkpatrick Co-Investigator on AAMC Grant

News from the Department of Neurology

- Glynnis Zieman, MD, FAHS, and Ashley Bridwell, traumatic brain injury social worker, delivered the keynote talk at an international conference supporting survivors of abuse and brain injury through research on Feb. 24. Zieman is a neurologist in the Concussion and Brain Injury Center at Barrow Neurological Institute and assistant clinical professor at the School of Medicine, Phoenix Campus.
- The Barrow Neurological Institute at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center in Phoenix created a registry for patients with spontaneous intracranial hypotension which will be utilized to conduct research to refine diagnostic and treatment algorithms.
- In addition, the Headache Program has inpatient treatment protocols for which Barrow Neurological Institute is actively admitting refractory headache patients.

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
